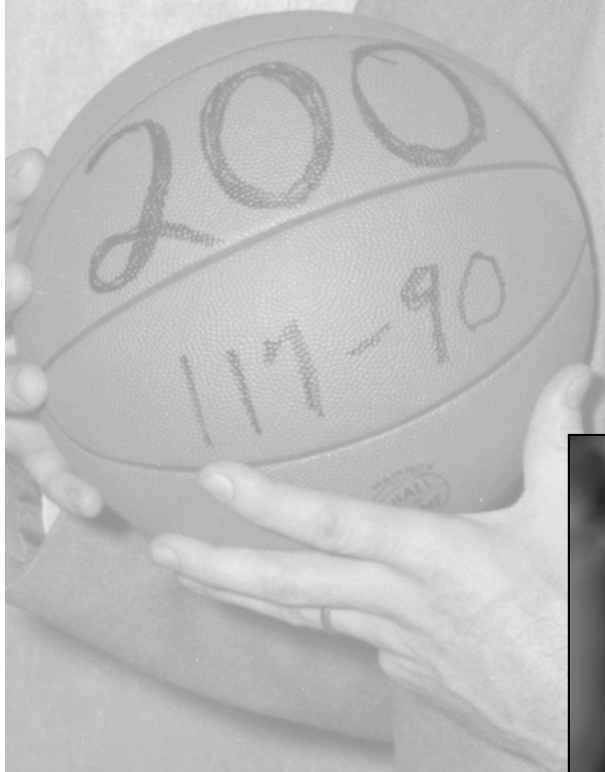


HISTORY



SJU BY THE NUMBERS

1 The national ranking Saint Joseph's earned in both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today polls of March 8, 2004. It marked the first time ever that the Hawks were the nation's top-ranked team during the regular season. Another number-one spot in SJU history came when *Sports Illustrated* gave the Hawks the top preseason ranking prior to the 1965-66 season.

2 Consecutive seasons **Jameer Nelson** led the Atlantic 10 Conference in assists per game. Nelson, who led the league in assists in each of his first two seasons on Hawk Hill (2000-01, 2001-02), is the only player in conference history to lead the A-10 in assists in consecutive seasons.

3 Three-point field goals, which the Hawks have specialized in. SJU had a streak of 495 consecutive games in which it hit at least one 3-point field goal, which spanned from 1993-94 to 2008-09. **Pat Carroll** finished his career as the Hawks' all-time leader and the A-10 leader in career 3-point percentage (.445)

4 The number **Jeffery Clark**, the point guard on the 1980-81 team, would raise above his head to signal the team's famed "four-to-score" offense. The offense worked to perfection in SJU's stunning 49-48 upset of #1 DePaul in the 1981 NCAA Tournament.

5 Consecutive Atlantic 10 regular season titles won by the Hawks (from 1999-00 to 2004-05) to share the conference record with the Massachusetts' teams of the mid-1990's.

6 Number of players referred to as the "Mighty Mites", which helped put Saint Joseph's on the national basketball map in the 1930's. The "Mites" – **Jim Smale, Matt Guokas, Sr., John Kenney, John McMenamin, Dan Kenney** and **Joe Oakes** – compiled a 54-17 overall mark from 1934-38.

7 Number of Saint Joseph's alumni that have been head coaches in the NBA. Only Indiana has had more graduates (11) coach in the league.

8 Number of Hawks to foul out of a January 10, 1976, double overtime loss at Xavier. SJU finished the game with two eligible players as the NCAA, at the time, had a 10-man limit on travel parties. That restriction was soon lifted following the contest. The eight disqualifications is still an NCAA Division I basketball record.

10 Number of times legendary coach **Dr. Jack Ramsay** guided his teams to postseason appearances in his 11 years. Ramsay, who compiled a 234-72 record over his tenure at SJU (1955-56 through 1965-66), led the Hawks to the NIT Final Four in 1956 and the NCAA Final Four in 1961.

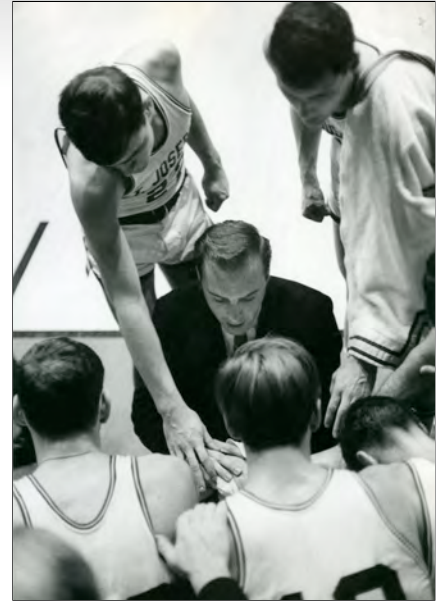
11 Number of Middle Atlantic Conference Championships that Saint Joseph's won from 1959 through 1974. SJU competed in that league, which also included current Atlantic 10 Conference members La Salle and Temple, from 1957-58 through 1973-74 before joining the now-defunct East Coast Conference. The Hawks joined the A-10, their current league, in 1982.

14 Uniform number worn by **Jameer Nelson**, which was retired after the 2003-04 season. Nelson was the consensus National Player of the Year, and the school's first-ever Wooden Award winner, while leading the Hawks to the magical perfect regular season and a berth in the NCAA Elite Eight.

17 Record for postseason coaching victories, NCAA and NIT combined, currently held by **Phil Martelli**.

19 Number of field goals made in a game by **George Senesky** against Rutgers-Newark on February 3, 1943. Senesky received the Helms Foundation Award given to the National Player of the Year and is the only Hawk player to lead the nation in scoring (23.4 ppg) in a season.

20 Individual season scoring average, a mark rarely eclipsed by the normally balanced SJU offense over the years. Before Marvin O'Connor averaged 22.1 points per game during the 2000-01 season, the last Hawks to accomplish the feat were Pat McFarland and Mike Bantom, who both averaged 20.3 points per game during 1972-73. McFarland edged Bantom by one point for the scoring title that year, the closest race in SJU history. Jameer Nelson then achieved the feat in 2003-04 with his 20.6 mark.



Jack McKinney is one of seven Saint Joseph's alumni to have worked as head coaches in the NBA.

26 Number of years **Phil Martelli** has been on the coaching staff at Saint Joseph's, with 10 seasons as an assistant and 2010-11 being his 16th as head coach.

27 Number of consecutive wins for the 2003-04 team which became the first team to go through the regular season without a loss since UNLV in 1990-91. The streak stands as the longest in SJU history.

30 School record for wins achieved by the 2003-04 team, which finished with just two losses en route to a final national ranking of fifth.

33 Points scored by **Delonte West** in his "perfect game" on January 17, 2004 at Xavier. West made 12-of-12 field goals, went 3-for-3 from three-point range, and 6-for-6 from the foul line.

34 SJU record for rebounds in a game set by **John Doogan** against West Chester on February 18, 1953.

36 Number of games played by the 2004-05 squad, which is a school record. The Hawks played six games in the NIT as they reached the final.

40 Record for points scored at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse set by Ed Garrity in a 111-92 win over Rhode Island on February 4, 1953.

47 School record for points set by **Jack Egan** against Gettysburg on January 21, 1961 and later tied by **Tony Costner** against Alaska-Anchorage on December 30, 1983.

Jack Egan set the record for most points in a game (47) and still shares that mark with Tony Costner.

50 The golden anniversaries of both the Hawk mascot and the Philadelphia Big 5 were celebrated in 2005-06. The Hawk made its debut on the court on January 4, 1956 (a 69-56 win over La Salle at The Palestra). The Big 5, which marked its 50th anniversary in 2005-06, is one of the most unique arrangements in the nation and is known for the intense city rivalries. Saint Joseph's played rival Villanova in the first-ever Big 5 game on December 14, 1955, with the Hawks scoring an 83-70 win.

57.5 Number of seconds it took **Marvin O'Connor** to score 18 points in the Hawks' 91-90 loss to La Salle on March 3, 2001. The guard finished the game with a career-high 37 points. O'Connor would also go on to score 37 points later that year in the heartbreaking 90-87 loss to Stanford in the NCAA Second Round.

59 Number of seasons at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse. The Hawks returned to campus in 2009-10 to the expanded and renovated Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena.

79.9 Free throw percentage for the 2005-06 Hawks, which was the best in the nation.

98 Victories compiled by the winningest four-year class in Saint Joseph's history – **Tyrone Barley** and **Jameer Nelson**.

100 The Centennial of Saint Joseph's basketball was celebrated in the 2009-10 season.

120 Dollars – the cost of the first Hawk costume purchased by Jim Brennan prior to the 1955-56 season. The most decorated mascot in the nation, the Hawk celebrated its 50th anniversary in

2005-06, and has "flown" at every game since debuting at The Palestra against La Salle on January 4, 1956.

128 Most points scored by an SJU team. The Hawks defeated Nevada, 128-66, at The Palestra on December 15, 1971.

135 Record for games played in a career, set by **Rob Ferguson** from 2003-08.

144 Number of coaching wins by **Jack McKinney** (1966-67 thru 1973-74), who later went on to coach in the NBA, winning Coach of the Year honors with the Indiana Pacers.

247 Combined point total in Hawks' 127-120 win in four overtime periods over Utah in the national third place game at the 1961 NCAA Final Four. It still stands as a school record for overtimes played by an SJU team and combined point total by two teams in a game.

309 Number of wins recorded by SJU coach **Bill Ferguson** from 1928-29 through 1952-53. Ferguson's win total and length of service (25 years) are SJU basketball records.

411 Number of men's basketball games played at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse. The final game was a 71-66 upset of #8 Xavier on March 6, 2008.

419 Career blocks record established by **Rodney Blake** from 1984-88. When he finished his career, Blake was the NCAA's all-time leader in career blocks. That record has since been broken.



Ed Garrity set the Fieldhouse record for points in a game with 40 against Rhode Island on February 4, 1953. The record has lasted for over 50 years.



Delonte West had the "perfect game" at Xavier on Jan. 17, 2004, making all of his shots - 12-for-12 from the field, 3-for-3 from beyond the arc and 6-for-6 from the free throw line.

1,493 Number of wins by Hawk teams over the 101 seasons of intercollegiate basketball.

2,094 SJU record for points scored in a career, established by **Jameer Nelson** from 2000 to 2004.

3,200 Previous capacity at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse, which had more than 125 sellouts over the past 12 seasons.

3,500 Average number of times the Hawk flaps its wings during a regulation basketball game as estimated by ESPN's "flap-o-meter."

4,200 Capacity at the Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena, which was dedicated on October 17, 2009, with the first game being a 77-67 overtime win over Drexel on November 13, 2009.

BILL FERGUSON 1928-53

Longest-tenured basketball coach in SJU history, compiling a 309-208 record in 25 seasons...Holds SJU record for wins...Coached the legendary "Mighty Mites" squad which compiled a 54-17 (.761) mark from 1934-38...Mentored future coaching standouts such as Jack Kraft, Jack Ramsay, and George Senesky, who was also an All-American in 1942-43...His team's record in the decade of the 1940's was 132-78...1952 team was the first SJU squad to enter a postseason tournament, the National Catholic Invitational, and was the first team to win 20 games in a season...Inducted into the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame in 1973 and the Athletics Hall of Fame in 2000.

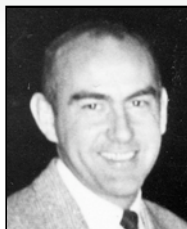


JOHN McMENAMIN 1953-55

Took over the reins of Hawk head coach from his mentor Bill Ferguson...Was at the helm for two seasons and then followed by Jack Ramsay...Coached standouts such as Kurt Englebert and Mike Fallon...Was one of the "Mighty Mites" coached by Ferguson...Inducted into the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame in 1975 and into the Athletics Hall of Fame in 2000.

JACK RAMSAY 1955-66

Considered one of the finest teachers of the game...Amassed a 234-72 record (.765) in 11 years, owning the school record for winning percentage and now the third most wins in SJU history...Led the Hawks to five consecutive NCAA berths and nine straight postseason bids, which are both the most by a Hawk coach...Overall, missed the postseason only once in 11 years...His 1961 team made the only Final Four appearance in school history...The 1965-66 Hawks were chosen as the nation's preseason #1 team by *Sports Illustrated*...Went on to a successful NBA career, winning 864 games in 21 seasons, while leading Portland to the 1976-77 NBA title...Inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1992...Member of the Big 5 Hall of Fame (1983), the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame (1999) and the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame (1974)...Graduated from Saint Joseph's in 1949.

JACK MCKINNEY 1966-74

Oversaw some of the Hawks' best teams, reaching the NCAA Tournament five times in his eight seasons...Compiled a record of 144-77 (.651)...Named the 1973-74 Eastern Coach of the Year...Mentored Hawk greats such as All-Americans Cliff Anderson and Mike Bantom...Swept the MAC regular season three times...Coached in the NBA for five seasons with Indiana and the L.A. Lakers, posting 135 wins...Helped the Lakers to their 1980 NBA title...Earned NBA Coach of the Year honors with Indiana in 1981...Inducted into the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame (2004), the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame (1980) and the Big 5 Hall of Fame (1992)...A 1957 graduate of Saint Joseph's, he played for Jack Ramsay.

HARRY BOOTH 1974-78

Owned the unique distinction of being a team captain and head coach in both baseball and basketball...Before being named head coach in 1974, spent eight years on the staff, with three as freshman coach...Teammate of Jim Lynam's while playing under Jack Ramsay... Coached Hawk standouts such as Boo

Williams and Norman Black, as well as future head coach John Griffin...Won 140 games as Hawk baseball coach...Inducted into the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame in 2006.

JIM LYNAM 1978-81

In just three seasons as head coach, led the Hawks to the postseason every year...Included in that span was the memorable upset of top-ranked DePaul in the 1981 NCAA Second Round and the advancement to the Elite Eight...Implemented the "Four to Score" offensive scheme...Compiled a 65-28 (.698) mark in

his three seasons...Team swept the 1979-80 City Series, one of his two Big 5 titles...Went 28-5 in ECC play...Member of the Big 5 Hall of Fame (1975), the SJU Athletics Hall of Fame (2003) and the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame (1975)...1963 Saint Joseph's graduate.

JIM BOYLE 1981-90

Started coaching career on Hawk Hill by reeling off four postseason appearances in five years...Only Hawk coach to reach the NCAA Tournament in his first season...Posted a 151-114 (.569) record including three 20-win seasons...Earned both Atlantic 10 and Big 5 Coach of the Year honors in 1985-86...Won two Big 5 crowns...Won the 1982 ECC Tournament and the 1986 Atlantic 10 Conference Tournament titles...Led the 1983-84 upset of second-ranked DePaul...Coached eight NBA draft picks, including first-round choice Maurice Martin...Reached 100 wins in only his fifth season, one of only two SJU coaches to do so...Was an assistant coach for the NBA's Denver Nuggets...Member of the Big 5 Hall of Fame (1997) and SJU's Basketball Hall of Fame (1981)...1964 graduate of the university who played for Jack Ramsay.

JOHN GRIFFIN 1990-95

Revived SJU basketball in a five-year stint that included two postseason appearances and a 75-69 (.521) record...Guided the Hawks to two berths in the NIT...Served as a Hawk assistant for two years under Jim Lynam and Jim Boyle...Went on to coach Siena College for four seasons, compiling a 70-44 record...Returned to SJU in 1987 as a part-time assistant for a year and then became the school's 13th head coach in 1990...Coached such SJU greats as Craig Amos, Rap Curry, and Bernard Blunt...1978 SJU graduate who played under Harry Booth.

PHIL MARTELLI 1995-present

Has guided the Hawks to nine postseason berths and seven in the last 10 years...Only SJU coach to earn National Coach of the Year honors as he led the Hawks to a 30-2 record in 2003-04, which included an unbeaten regular season (27-0), the number-one national ranking and a berth in the Elite Eight...Four-time Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year...Led SJU to the 1997 A-10 Tournament title...Now ranks second on the SJU all-time list for wins with 289 entering the 2010-11 season...Owns the best postseason record of any SJU coach with a 17-9 mark...Coached the 2004 Wooden Award winner and consensus National Player of the Year Jameer Nelson...Has three former players who were NBA Draft picks - Nelson, Delonte West and Ahmad Nivins.

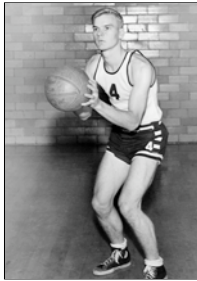

GEORGE SENESKY 1939-43



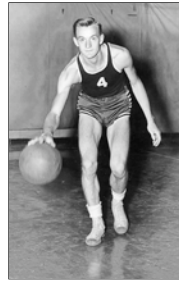
Helms Foundation National Player of the Year in 1943...All-America selection in 1942-43...The 6-3 forward from Mahanoy City, Pa., was the only Saint Joseph's player to lead the nation in scoring, averaging 23.4 points per game as a senior in 1942-43...His 515 points that year set a new school mark...Scored 44 points vs. Rutgers-Newark (2/3/44), to set a school record which has since been broken. Had 19 field goals in that game, which still stands as the school record...Played for the Philadelphia Warriors of the NBA, and later coached the franchise to the 1956 NBA Championship...Member of SJU's Athletics Hall of Fame (1999) and Basketball Hall of Fame (1973).

PAUL SENESKY 1947-50



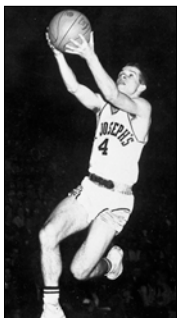
After his final year, held the all-time scoring record with 1,471 points over the course of 72 games, a marks which has since been broken...Currently ranks 18th on all-time list...His 20.7 scoring average is the highest career scoring average for any SJU player...Ranks 12th on the single-season scoring list with 570 points totalled during his senior season...Led the Hawks in scoring for three straight years, averaging a high of 22.8 points as a senior...Native of Mahanoy City, Pa., was a fourth-round draft choice of the Philadelphia Warriors...SJU Basketball Hall of Fame inductee in 1976.

JIM LYNAM 1960-63



Three-year starting point guard...Helped guide Hawks to three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, including the 1961 Final Four...A 5-8 guard from Havertown, Pa., who was named Big 5 Co-MVP as a senior in 1963...Earned All-Regional honors at both the 1961 and 1963 NCAA Tournaments...Tallied career-high 31 points against Utah in 1961 Final Four, earning a spot on the All-Finals Second Team...His 390 career assists ranks ninth on the SJU all-time list...Also tallied 1,012 points in 83 games...Served as head coach at SJU from 1978 to 1981, compiling a three-year mark of 65-28...Led team to two NIT berths and a spot in the 1981 NCAA Elite Eight...Was a head coach for nine seasons in the NBA, winning 328 games with stints at the L.A. Clippers, Philadelphia and Washington...Also served as an NBA assistant coach for a number of years...Member

of the Big 5 Hall of Fame (1975), SJU Athletics Hall of Fame (2003) and the SJU Basketball Hall of Fame (1975).

BILLY OAKES 1963-66



Tallied 1,129 points as a three-year starting point guard...Ranks 33rd on the Hawks' all-time scoring list...Averaged double-figure points in all three seasons with high average of 16.0 ppg as a junior...Helped lead 1964-65 team to a 26-3 record and a No. 3 final ranking by the Associated Press...As a senior, he directed the Hawks to a 24-5 mark, a No. 5 final ranking, and the highest team scoring average (91.1 ppg) in school history...Longtime NBA official...Member of the Saint Joseph's Basketball Hall of Fame (1978).

Jameer Nelson's number 14 was raised to the rafters on April 23, 2004. The first announcement of the number retirement, however, came after the final regular season game on March 2, 2004. Nelson stated that he "had more games to play" and deferred the retirement to the end of the season.

MEMORABLE GAMES

The following is a look at just some of the most memorable games in Saint Joseph's history.

January 4, 1956 – La Salle

The passion of Saint Joseph's University fans for their basketball team begins with The Hawk mascot. Jim Brennan made his debut as The Hawk on January 4, 1956 in a win over La Salle at The Palestra.

February 22, 1956 – Temple

Under coach Jack Ramsay, the Hawks win their first Big 5 game, defeating 10th-ranked Temple at The Palestra, 77-68.

March 18, 1961 – Wake Forest

With Dr. Jack Ramsay at the helm, Saint Joseph's advanced to the only NCAA Final Four in its history with a 96-86 win over Wake Forest in Charlotte, N.C. Ramsay's most successful team (25-5) would go on to lose to eventual national champion Ohio State in the semifinals in Kansas City, Mo., but win the consolation game with a four-overtime 127-120 victory over Utah.

January 16, 1966 – Villanova

Saint Joseph's was ranked fifth in the nation, but was struggling against archrival Villanova (which sported a 5-7 record) at The Palestra. Villanova led the whole way and when top scorer Billy Oakes fouled out, the Hawks' chances seemed slim. But coach Jack Ramsay inserted seldom-used Steve Donches into the game. Donches rewarded Ramsay's faith by hitting a 35-footer from along the sideline to give Saint Joseph's the 71-69 victory. It still ranks as one of the most famous shots in Hawk history.

March 14, 1981 – DePaul

"Fourth and Shunk" is a legendary phrase in Saint Joseph's lore, recalling the play that led to one of the most improbable upsets in NCAA history, when the Hawks defeated No. 1 DePaul, 49-48. John Smith put in a layup at the buzzer to stun the Blue Demons in the NCAA Second Round at Dayton in the Hawks' first-ever national television appearance. The play developed when DePaul missed a free throw with 13 seconds left. Bryan Warrick rebounded, dribbled through the Blue Demons and passed to Lonnie McFarlan, who then fed Smith for the gamewinner. "Fourth and Shunk" is the playground in Philadelphia that Smith frequented as a youngster.

February 25, 1993 – George Washington

Bernard Blunt, Rap Curry, and Carlin Warley combine for the most dramatic finish in Fieldhouse history.

The Hawks go the length of the floor in the final 2.7 seconds and Blunt's jumper defeats George Washington, 74-73.

March 3, 1986 – West Virginia

The Hawks capture their first Atlantic 10 Tournament title, defeating West Virginia, 72-64 at The Meadowslands.

December 7, 1996 – Tulsa

Senior sixth man Terrell Myers provided the heroics, hitting a 3-pointer at the buzzer to stun #21 Tulsa, 67-64, in the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic in Atlantic City.

March 1, 1997 – La Salle

Rashid Bey's 3-pointer at the buzzer provided the Hawks with their first A-10 regular season title, with the 62-59 win over La Salle at the Spectrum. Bey, who scored the Hawks' final seven points, took the inbounds pass and drove to the top of the key for the winning shot.

March 3, 2001 – La Salle

One of the most remarkable individual performances in Saint Joseph's history happened in less than a minute in the 91-90 loss to La Salle at Hayman Hall. Junior Marvin O'Connor scored 18 points in 57.5 seconds to finish the game with 37 points.

March 17, 2001 – Stanford

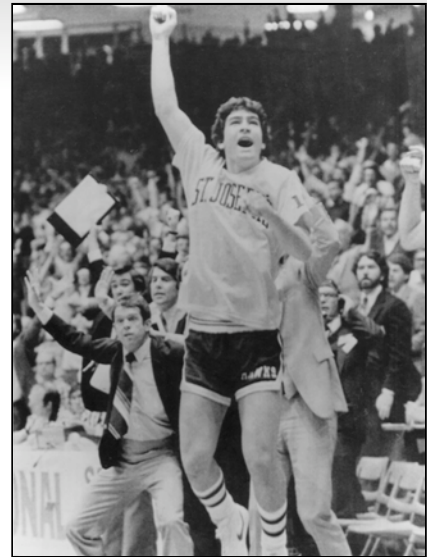
Marvin O'Connor turned in another memorable effort in a heartbreaking 90-83 loss to Stanford in the NCAA Second Round in San Diego. O'Connor tallied a game-high 37 points, while scoring Saint Joseph's first 12 points of the second half. He made 15-of-20 shots and went 10-for-10 inside the three-point line. When O'Connor fouled out of the game with 11.9 seconds remaining, the Stanford faithful gave him a standing ovation and saluted him by chanting "Mar-vin, Mar-vin!"

February 3, 2003 – Villanova

In a game that is always referred to as "40 to 9" by Hawk fans, Jameer Nelson led all scorers with 30 points to lead SJU to a 92-75 win over Villanova. In front of a national TV audience and a standing-room only crowd at The Palestra, the Hawks took a commanding 40-9 lead with 6:29 remaining in the first half and coasted the rest of the way, en route to a share of the Big 5 title.

January 17, 2004 – Xavier

Delonte West pitched a "perfect game" in sixth-ranked Saint Joseph's win over Atlantic 10 rival Xavier, 81-73, in Cincinnati. West made every shot

he took – 12 from the field, three from 3-point range and six from the line – for a career-high 33 points. A national television audience and sellout crowd at the Cintas Center watched the performance that set a new A-10 record and tied the SJU mark for field goals without a miss.

March 2, 2004 – St. Bonaventure

Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse was packed like never before with a standing room only crowd, two separate television broadcast crews and close to 120 media members. It was a season finale that was more ceremony than competition as Saint Joseph's beat St. Bonaventure, 82-59, to finish the regular season with a perfect 27-0 record.

March 25, 2004 – Wake Forest

The magic continued when the Hawks advanced to within one game of the Final Four, defeating Wake Forest, 84-80, in the NCAA Regional Semifinal in East Rutherford, N.J. Top-seeded Saint Joseph's used clutch perimeter shooting to erase a nine-point first half deficit. Jameer Nelson and Delonte West each scored 24 points to lead the Hawks to the Elite Eight for the first time since 1981.

January 26, 2008 – Temple

Pat Calathes hit a 3-point shot with 3.9 seconds left to give SJU a 68-67 win over city rival Temple at the Liacouras Center. The shot provided a fitting end to a close game in which neither team held more than a two-point lead over the last 10 minutes.

March 6, 2008 – Xavier

The Hawks closed out Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse in style, upsetting eighth-ranked Xavier, 71-65, in the final regular-season game before the 59-year old venue underwent expansion and renovation. SJU celebrated the past with a ceremony of former players and coaches, including Dr. Jack Ramsay and Jameer Nelson. It was the highest ranked team ever beaten at the Fieldhouse.

November 13, 2009 – Drexel

Saint Joseph's defeats Drexel in overtime, 77-67, in the inaugural game in the Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena.

HAGAN ARENA

A new era of Saint Joseph's basketball began on October 17, 2009, with the dedication of the Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena.

The opening of the arena was the culmination of the two-year expansion and renovation of Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse, which was the home of the Hawks since 1949. Hagan Arena added approximately 1,000 seats to stretch the capacity to 4,200, while providing numerous other amenities that were not available in the Fieldhouse.

The Hawks played the first game in the arena against city rival Drexel, on November 13, 2009. A standing-room-only crowd saw an exciting 77-67 overtime win for Saint Joseph's as senior Darrin Govens led the way with 23 points.

Saint Joseph's hosted 12 games in Hagan Arena in 2009-10, compiling a 7-5 record. In addition to the season-opening win over Drexel, the Hawks also scored a thrilling 60-59 victory over Dayton, which eventually won the 2010 NIT title. The Hawks closed out the year in Hagan Arena defeating La Salle, 87-76, to earn a berth in the Atlantic 10 Tournament.

ALUMNI MEMORIAL FIELDHOUSE

Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse was the well-loved shrine and home of the Hawks for 59 seasons. With the completion of the multi-year expansion and renovation project that began in Fall 2007, this storied facility was preserved, while bringing the athletic complex to a level befitting such a venerable tradition. Beginning with the 2009-10 season, the new home of the Hawks was the Michael J. Hagan '85 Arena.

Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse was named for Saint Joseph's graduates who gave their lives in World War II. The building was dedicated on November 11, 1949, and 15 days later hosted its first basketball game, a 62-46 loss to Rhode Island.

Overall, the men's basketball team compiled a stellar 319-82 record (.795 winning percentage) in Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse. Among the highlights were a 34-game winning streak from the late 1950s to the early 1960s, an 11-0 record in 2000-01, and another 11-0 mark as the Hawks completed a perfect regular season in 2003-04 behind consensus Player of the Year Jameer Nelson and consensus Coach of the Year Phil Martelli.

For much of the 1980s and 1990s, the Fieldhouse was the practice home of the NBA's Philadelphia 76ers. This was a natural extension of a legacy in which Saint Joseph's products – George Senesky '43, Dr. Jack Ramsay '49, Jack McKinney '57, Paul Westhead '61, Jim Lynam '63, Matt Goukas '66, and Jim O'Brien '74 – would become head coaches in the NBA.

Women's basketball came to the Fieldhouse as a Division I program in 1973. In 35 seasons, the women's team compiled an equally impressive 332-117 record (.739 winning percentage) on its home floor. Former Hawk players and coaches include Theresa Grentz, Rene Muth Portland, Jim Foster, Muffet McGraw O'Brien '77, and Geno Auriemma.

The 3,200-seat Fieldhouse hosted more than 125 sellouts over the last 15 seasons. Excitement was at a fever pitch in 2003-04 as crowds watched the Hawks make their historic run to a number one ranking. The Fieldhouse has played an even larger role in the University's history. Major events such as Commencement, the Hand-in-Hand Festival, and the annual Martin Luther King Day celebration have been held in the building, along with the centennial celebration of the College in 1951. Martin Luther King, Jr., spoke at the Fieldhouse in 1967.

Yet it is the passion of Hawk fans that stands as the greatest legacy of Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse. In 2003, *Sports Illustrated* listed "The 100 Things You Have to Do Before You Graduate." Ranked No. 12 was: "Go to a Saint Joseph's basketball game and shout 'The Hawk Will Never Die' — the most defiant cheer in college sports."

ALUMNI MEMORIAL FIELDHOUSE

GREAT FIELDHOUSE MOMENTS

Saint Joseph's win over Xavier on March 6, 2008, marked the final game in Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse before an extensive expansion and renovation project was to begin. Here's a look at some of the most memorable games in Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse history, in chronological order.

November 26, 1949: Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse hosts its first college basketball game as Rhode Island defeats Saint Joseph's, 62-46.

February 4, 1953: Ed Garrity pours in 40 points in a 111-92 win over Rhode Island, setting a Fieldhouse scoring record that has lasted for over 50 years.

December 6, 1955: Saint Joseph's defeats Millersville, 76-60, in the Fieldhouse debut of new coach Jack Ramsay.

December 7, 1965: In their final season together, all-time greats Jack Ramsay, Cliff Anderson, and Matt Goukas play only one Fieldhouse game (a 98-68 rout of Bellarmine).

January 17, 1974: The first Saint Joseph's women's basketball team, coached by Ellen Ryan, makes its debut against three-time national champion Immaculata. The Mighty Macs win, 59-24.

February 5, 1974: In his final season as head coach, Jack McKinney's "grim, grisly, and gruesome" Hawks defeat Georgetown, 70-64.

March 8, 1976: Women's basketball, with former Immaculata star Theresa Grentz coaching, defeats Rutgers, 80-52.

February 25, 1978: Under coach Rene Portland, another former Immaculata star, the women's team defeats No. 10 Montclair State, 85-76. It is the Hawks' third win over a Top 10 team at the Fieldhouse that season.

March 4, 1981: Coach Jim Lynam's Hawks, playing without injured star Bryan Warrick, leads the Hawks to a 60-55 win over Temple in the East Coast Conference quarterfinals.

January 15, 1985: National women's coach of the year Jim Foster leads Saint Joseph's to a 71-63 win over No. 10 Penn State.

February 27, 1986: Saint Joseph's defeats Penn State, 59-51, in an Atlantic 10 quarterfinal game which eventually leads to its first Atlantic 10 title at the Meadowlands.

March 11, 1987: The women's basketball team wins the first NCAA Tournament game in program history, defeating South Alabama at the Fieldhouse, 67-56.

January 4, 1990: Philadelphia native Bo Kimble sets a new Fieldhouse record with 54 points, including a near-halfcourt shot at the buzzer, as Loyola Marymount nips the Hawks, 99-96.

February 4, 1991: First-year coach John Griffin leads an upset of Elite Eight-bound Temple, 66-60. It is believed to be the first time the Saint Joseph's student section ever stormed the court at the Fieldhouse.

February 25, 1993: Bernard Blunt, Rap Curry, and Carlin Warley combine for the most dramatic finish in Fieldhouse history. The Hawks go the length of the floor in the final 2.7 seconds and Blunt's jumper nips George Washington, 74-73.

February 15, 1994: Reserve Kevin Connor hits two foul shots with no time left as the Hawks upset No. 10 Massachusetts, 81-80.

January 10, 1996: Three free throws by Terrell Myers with no time left send a game with No. 1 Massachusetts into overtime, but the Minutemen prevail, 94-89.

January 2, 1997: The women's basketball teams hosts No. 8 Tennessee before an overflow Fieldhouse crowd, with the Lady Vols prevailing, 64-52.

February 25, 1997: Many claim the Fieldhouse was at its all-time loudest as the Hawks end Massachusetts' streak of five consecutive Atlantic 10 regular-season championships with a 78-63 victory.

November 18, 2001: Former Hawk Cindy Griffin returns as women's basketball coach and defeats No. 23 Rutgers, 64-58, in her second game.

March 5, 2003: All-America David West of Xavier outlasts counterpart Jameer Nelson of the Hawks in an 88-80 overtime victory for the No. 18 Musketeers.

March 2, 2004: Saint Joseph's defeats St. Bonaventure, 82-50, to complete a perfect regular season (27-0).

March 21, 2005: Saint Joseph's wins its third consecutive National Invitation Tournament game in six days at the Fieldhouse, 68-60, over Holy Cross, and eventually reaches the NIT championship game.

March 6, 2008: The "Fieldhouse Finale" saw many former SJU coaches, players and mascots in attendance, including Jack Ramsay, Mike Bantom and Jameer Nelson. The on-court Hawks added to the celebration with a 71-66 upset of No. 8 Xavier, the highest ranked team ever beaten at the Fieldhouse.

THE PALESTRA

Saint Joseph's has utilized The Palestra as a home venue ever since the beginning of competition of the Philadelphia Big 5 in 1955, playing a number of games there every year. The 2010-11 season marks the 57th of the Hawks' use of the site. The Palestra remains an integral part of the history of Saint Joseph's basketball.

Saint Joseph's "home away from home," the historic Palestra was the Hawks' full-time homecourt for the 2008-09 season as Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse was closed due to the expansion and renovation project. SJU played 13 home games at The Palestra on the campus of the University of Pennsylvania that season, with the only exception being the season opener against Rider, which was played at the Wachovia Center.

Once the Michael J. Hagan Arena was completed in 2009-10, the Hawks went back to playing a few key city games at The Palestra.

First opened during the 1926-27 season, the building is one of the premier basketball meccas in the world. The 8,722-seat arena has been the home for more than 70 years of Penn basketball and 50 years of Big 5 doubleheaders. It has hosted a multitude of events, including 50 NCAA Tournament games as part of 19 national championship competitions, as well as numerous NIT contests, a season of women's professional games (American Basketball League), and even NBA games in the early history of the league.

Saint Joseph's has won 67 percent of its Palestra games over the years, and continues to schedule its Big 5 home game in the building.

The Palestra was cited as "Host to the first NCAA basketball championship game in 1939, and countless classic Philadelphia Big 5 matchups." It is the subject of a 2007 documentary film, *The Palestra: Cathedral of Basketball*.

It was mentioned at the top of the list of "Must Visit Sports Shrines" in *Sports Illustrated's* (SI.com) "100 Things You Have to Do Before You Graduate." It was also ranked 34th in ESPN.com's list of the "America's 100 Most Important Sports Venues."

During the summer of 2008 a new floor was installed, replacing one which had existed since the 1980s.

SJU and Penn brought back a treasured Palestra tradition on January 28, 2006 to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Big 5. The schools agreed to allow their student sections to throw streamers after each team's first field goal, which had been a practice at every City Series game until banned by the NCAA in 1985.

THE PALESTRA



The Palestra, one of the most historic arenas in college basketball, is the Hawks' "home away from home." The Hawks have averaged five games there per season over the years, but in 2008-09, played all but one of their 14 home games in the building because of the expansion and renovation project at Alumni Memorial Fieldhouse.

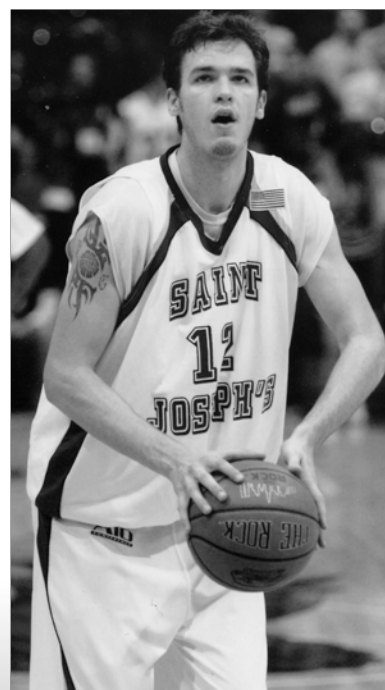

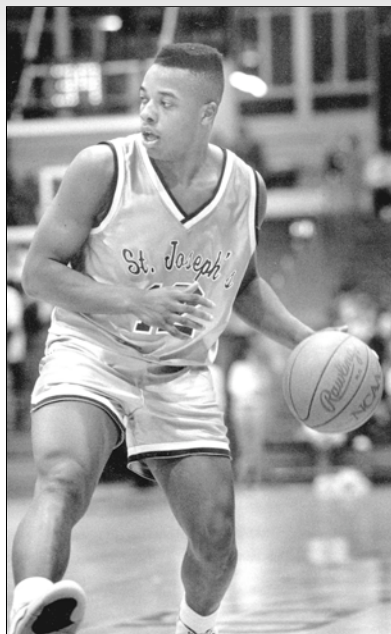


Marvin O'Connor holds the school record for points in a season (706), set in 2000-01.
