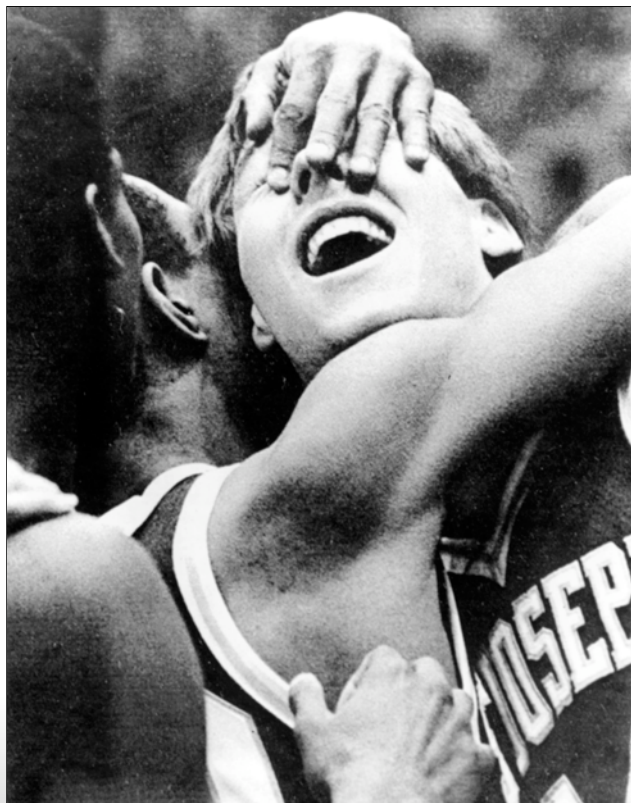

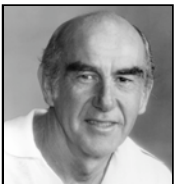
Coaching Dynasty

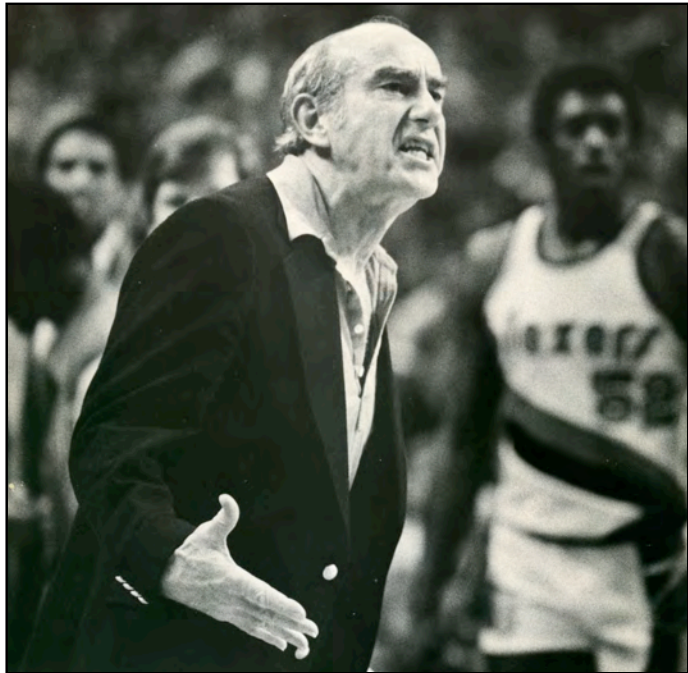

Jim O'Brien, the seventh former SJU player to serve as a head coach in the NBA, coached the Indiana Pacers from 2008 to 2011.

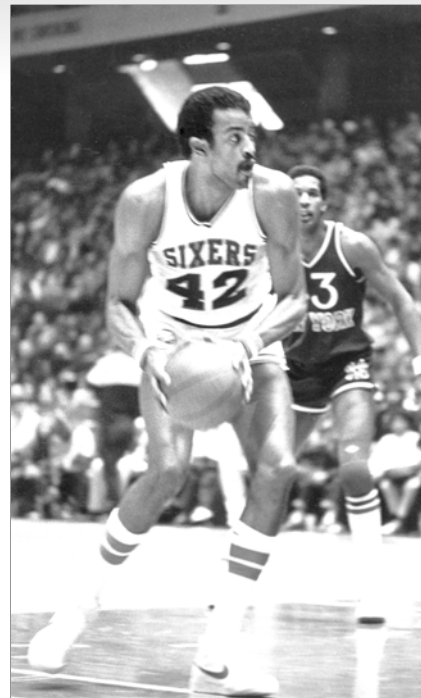

There's a buzz at St. Joe's

Small campus in Philadelphia in a frenzy over their Hawks

PHILADELPHIA — As two students walked through St. Joseph's wind-swept campus the other day, he turned to the other with a nagging question. 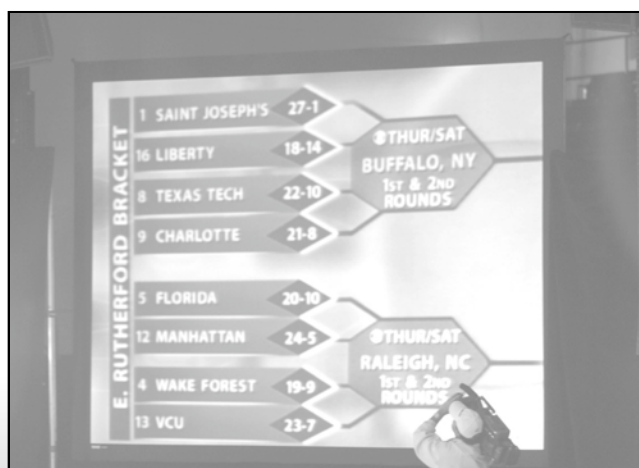
