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SEASON OUTLOOK

Despite the graduation of the two winningest players in program history, optimism surrounding the Saint Joseph's men's tennis team could not be higher. With a senior-laden core or returnees and arguably the program's most celebrated collection of newcomers, the Hawks have hopes for an Atlantic 10 Conference title in 2005-06.

The most successful class in program history, SJU's senior quartet of **Jimmy Holland**, **Antonio Aniello**, **A.J. Grabedian** and **Chris Spencer** have helped to elevate the Hawk program among the East's best. Possessing both talent and experience, they believe they have the ability to stake a claim to the Conference crown.

An All-Conference choice as a sophomore in 2004, Holland battled through an injury plagued junior season. Still one of the East's most gifted players, he is poised to ascend to the #1 singles slot after holding down the #2 position for three straight years.

Aniello, Garabedian and Spencer are also prepared to step up in the lineup.

Extremely versatile, Aniello took turns at #2 through #5 singles as a junior and paired with four different doubles partners, racking up wins wherever he played. Third in career victories at SJU, he could become the program's all-time leader in wins before the spring season opens. Look for him to team with Holland in doubles to give the Crimson and Gray a formidable duo at #1.

Garabedian has been a steady cog in the center of the SJU singles lineup throughout his career, while also

excelling in doubles. Like his father, who was a Hawk captain in the early 1970s, A.J. hopes to help SJU capture a Conference crown in his final time around the circuit.

Spencer, the final senior, comes off a breakout junior season in which he was named team MVP after topping the squad with 17 victories. Playing at #5 singles, he settled in regaining the confidence and displaying the ability he flashed at various points early in his career.

While the seniors will be the catalysts, a deep and talented group of newcomers, that includes sophomore transfer **Phil Garabedian**, as well as freshmen **Pat Adams**, **Phil Bayliss**, **Brian Costello**, **Fred Duncan** and **Brent Kahl**, mean that no slot in the lineup is safe. The renewed competition should bring out the best in the team's veterans, while allowing the first-year players to rapidly develop.

With an experienced group of seniors setting the tone and perhaps the most talented group of newcomers in program history pressing for time the Hawks have high expectations for 2005-06. If the Crimson and Gray can stay healthy and the first-year players provide a boost an A-10 title is within reach for SJU.

Head Coach

Temple '53 - 42nd Season

Hawk Hall of Famer Al Laveson, the dean of coaches at Saint Joseph's University, is the winningest coach in the history of the school. The 1953 Temple grad has compiled a 445-492 record in 41 seasons with the men's tennis team (283-321) and 24 seasons with the women (162-171). His coaching tenure at Saint Joseph's is the longest in school history.

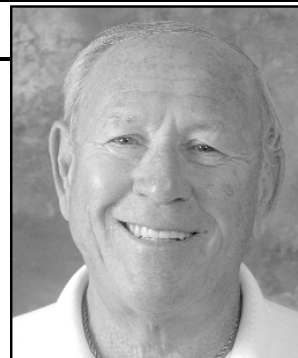
The long-time coach has helped lead a resurgence for the men's tennis team in the past three seasons. In 2002-03, the Hawks tied a school record with 15 wins and recorded a then best-ever showing at the Atlantic 10 Championships, placing fifth. The past two seasons, Laveson upgraded the schedule to include several nationally-ranked teams and SJU bettered its A-10 performance with a fourth place finish in 2004.

Laveson, who was inducted into the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2001, was the first Hawk mentor to reach 400 career wins with a men's tennis victory over Towson in the fall of 2002. He became only the second Hawk coach to reach the 300-win plateau in 1994, joining the legendary Bill Ferguson, who guided the Hawk basketball team to 309 victories over 25 years. He became the winningest Hawk coach one year later.

Captain of the Temple tennis team as a collegiate player, Laveson has been a teaching professional for the United States Professional Tennis Association for the past 39 years. He is also a past vice president of the organization.

Laveson retired from his full-time teaching position at Central High School in Philadelphia just before the 1994 season. Prior to his arrival at Central in 1987, he taught for 33 years at Penn Treaty Junior High School. Besides coaching at SJU, Laveson coached the boys' tennis team at Father Judge High for two years in the early 60s. He won City Championships in badminton and tennis at Central, along with a gymnastics title while at Penn Treaty. Laveson also coached girls' field hockey at Central.

Laveson, who resides in Philadelphia, is the father of three sons, Bob, Dave, and Peter. The two eldest were both SJU tennis team captains under their father.

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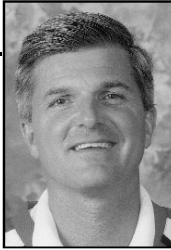


ASSISTANT COACHES

Gene Miller

**Assistant Coach
Navy '79 - Sixth Year**

Gene Miller is entering his sixth year as an assistant coach at Saint Joseph's University. Arriving on Hawk Hill after spending the 2000 fall season as an assistant coach at Rollins College, Miller brings a great store of tennis knowledge with him to SJU. While at Rollins, two of Miller's players won the NCAA Division II Doubles Championship.



Prior to his stint at Rollins, Miller served as an assistant coach at Southern Methodist University for two years. Responsible for all on-court conditioning and recruiting, Miller's squad received a national ranking as high as #5 in 1999, while reaching the Sweet 16 at the NCAA National Championships that same year.

Prior to SMU, Miller was the head men's coach at the University of Pennsylvania for seven years. At Penn, his accolades included seven Big 5 Championships, three Academic All-Americans and an Eastern Region ITA ranking of #3 in 1995 after guiding the Quakers to 21 victories.

A USPTA Professional, Miller has coached several All-Americans, including three in a single season at SMU. A 1979 graduate of the United States Naval Academy, Miller served in 18 combat missions in Desert Storm as a Navy F-14 fighter pilot. He received his Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry from the US Naval Academy before earning his Master's in Information Management from George Washington in 1989. He currently resides in Cherry Hill, N.J. and is a commercial pilot for Delta Airlines.

Francisco Velazquez

**Assistant Coach
Saint Joseph's '05 - First Year**

Joining the Saint Joseph's coaching staff in 2005-06 is former Hawk standout Francisco Velazquez. The all-time winningest player in program history at both singles (64) and doubles (67), the 2005 SJU grad is the only Hawk to be named to the Atlantic 10 All-Conference team four times.



As a senior, he posted an impressive 24-12 doubles mark while teaming with current Hawk A.J. Garabedian. The duo won the "A" Flight at the Swarthmore Invitational, reached the final of the Princeton Invitational, advanced to the Round of 16 at the ITA Championships and the Round of 16 in the back draw at the Pacific Coast Doubles Championship.

A native of Seroe Patrishi, Aruba, he competes on Aruba's National team and was selected for Team Topsport Elite, the pre-2008 Olympics training program. He was a four-time Aruba men's tennis champion.

Velazquez is currently completing his Master's degree in health education.

Laid out in a natural bowl in the center of Saint Joseph's campus, Finnesey Field has been the home of Hawk athletic teams since its inception in 1929. Originally constructed for football and opened in 1929 with plans for an eventual 70,000-seat stadium, the field has undergone numerous changes over the years.

In 1960, both the original grandstand and hillside seating were eliminated for the construction of Villiger (now Post) Hall/Bluett Theater. That construction necessitated raising the field's level some five feet above its earlier location. In 1990 the facility's usage was greatly expanded with the installation of artificial turf. That expansion continued in 1994 when lights were added. During the summer of 2001, the field received a facelift when new turf was installed. Just this past summer, bleachers were built into the hill closest to Barbelin Hall.

Finnesey Field is currently the home of SJU track and field, field hockey, men's and women's soccer and both men's and women's lacrosse. Previously, it played host to the football, baseball and softball teams.

Adjacent to Finnesey Field stand the Finnesey Courts, home to the Hawk men's and women's tennis teams since the late 1940s. Earlier than that, SJU primarily played its home matches at the nearby Narberth courts. When courts were first built on campus, they were located where Bellarmine Hall now stands. Due to Bellarmine's construction in the summer of 1960, however, the Finnesey Courts were torn down and rebuilt in their current location.

After briefly disappearing in the late 1990s due to Mandeville Hall's construction, the courts were refurbished in the summer of 2000 to provide a better playing facility for the athletes. The Saint Joseph's men's tennis team has compiled a record of 55-78 on the courts since 1983 and are riding a 11-match winning streak on Finnesey Courts.

DIRECTIONS TO FINNESEY COURTS

From the North: NJ Turnpike to Exit 6 (PA Turnpike connector). Follow PA Turnpike to exit 20 (Rt. 476). Follow 476 South to Rt. 76 East, toward Philadelphia. Follow Rt. 76 East to exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make left on 54th Street and then right into parking lot. Courts are straight ahead.

From the East: From the Ben Franklin Bridge (via Rt. 676) or the Walt Whitman Bridge: Follow Rt. 76 West to exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make left on 54th Street and then right into parking lot. Courts are straight ahead.

From the South: Rte. 95 North to 476 North. Follow 476 North to exit 5 (Rt. 1). Follow Rt. 1 North to SJU, approximately 10 miles. Make right on 54th Street and right into parking lot. Courts are straight ahead.

From the West: PA Turnpike to Exit 326 (Valley Forge). Follow Rt. 76 East, toward Philadelphia, to Exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make right on 54th Street and right into parking lot. Courts are straight ahead.

From the Airport: I-95 North to Rt. 76 West. Follow Rt. 76 West to exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make right on 54th Street and right into parking lot. Courts are straight ahead.

THE HAWK



The Saint Joseph's Hawk mascot has been flapping its wings for almost half a century, and celebrates its golden anniversary in 2005-06.

One of the most famous mascots in college sports, the Hawk is best known for staying in constant motion by flapping its wings throughout every basketball game and representing the Saint Joseph's motto, "The Hawk Will Never Die".

Saint Joseph's athletic teams have been recognized with the nickname "Hawks" since 1929. At that time, the school's yearbook editor initiated a contest among the student body for a symbol. More than 100 submissions were narrowed, with "Hawks" winning out over "Grenadiers" by a slim margin. The name was appropriate because it typified "the fighting spirit of our crimson and gray athletes and it is suggestive of the aerial attack which has made our football team famous." Football, ironically, was discontinued at SJU following the 1939 season.

The Hawk mascot has garnered numerous accolades in its 50-year history. It has been selected as the nation's top mascot by *The Sporting News*, *Sports Illustrated*, *Sports Illustrated for Kids*, *Street & Smith's Basketball Yearbook* and *ESPN College Basketball* magazine.

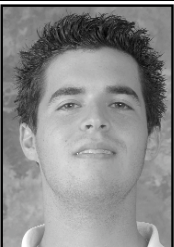

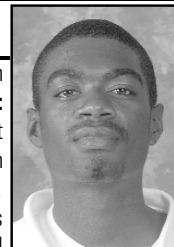

YEAR IN REVIEW



With a veteran lineup, including all six starters back in the fold, the 2004-05 season was expected to be a record-setting year for the Saint Joseph's men's tennis team. Nagging injuries would derail the team's bid for a first-ever Atlantic 10 title, but behind the play of seniors Francisco Velazquez and Van Homer Pangilinan the team still mustered a sixth place finish at the league championship and posted a solid 8-8 record against a highly competitive schedule that featured many of the East's top teams and tournaments.

The most decorated player in school history, Velazquez capped his record setting-career by garnering All-A-10 honors for the fourth straight season. The only SJU player to be honored more than once, the four-year starter at #1 singles and doubles finished as the Hawks' career leader in both singles (64) and doubles (67) victories.

As a senior, Velazquez finished 12-22 in singles play, but was at his best in doubles where he paired with junior A.J. Garabedian to post a 24-13 mark. The duo won the "A" Flight at the Swarthmore Invitational, reached the final of the Princeton Invite and advanced to the Round of 16 at the ITA Championships in the fall. They also went to the Round of 16 in the back draw at the Pacific Coast Double Tournament.

Pangilinan also concluded an impressive career. He finished second all-time with 59 singles and 58 doubles victories. As a senior he had the most success teaming with junior Chris Spencer in doubles, where the duo paired to go 12-10 primarily at #2 and #3.

In addition to their doubles prowess, Garabedian and Spencer placed among the team's leaders in singles victories. Spencer finished with a team-best 17-10 record, including a 9-3 mark at #5, the second highest total from the spot in program history. He also bested Pangilinan in the "C" Flight final at the Swarthmore Invitational. Garabedian was third on the team

with 14 wins, going 9-8 at #3 singles, and advanced to the "B" Flight consolation final at the Princeton Invite.

Two other juniors, Antonio Aniello and Jimmy Holland, played through nagging injuries and provided SJU with depth throughout the lineup. The unselfish Aniello took turns at #2 through #5 singles and finished second on the team with a 16 wins. In doubles, he found himself paired with four different partners during the year, mustering a 15-14 mark. Holland got off to a strong start, but would be slowed by a severe back injury. He still held down the #2 singles and doubles spots when healthy. Both fared well individually and pairing together in doubles at the ITA Championships.

While injuries deterred the team's bid for a first-ever A-10 title, the team continued to display growth against a constantly improving schedule. Despite the departure of Velazquez and Pangilinan, with the core of the lineup returning the future looks bright for the Hawk netters.

The Hawk Will Never Die!





On March 2, 1975, the idea of what is now the Atlantic 10 Conference was conceived. What started as an eight-school, men's basketball-only affiliation has grown into a 14-university, 21-sport league that is universally hailed as one of the best conferences in the country.

That growth and prominence is a direct result of the ideals and commitments of the member institutions of the Atlantic 10. The University of Dayton, Duquesne University, Fordham University, The George Washington University, La Salle University, University of Massachusetts, University of Rhode Island, University of Richmond, St. Bonaventure University, Saint Joseph's University, Temple University, and Xavier University have formed the foundation of the Atlantic 10 - a foundation which is further strengthened this season with the additions of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and Saint Louis University.

In 2005-06, the Atlantic 10 Conference celebrates its 30th anniversary season.

Although anniversaries are a good time to reflect, this anniversary is a celebration of the future as much as the past.

"It is with pride that we look back at our accomplishments and see how far this league has truly come," says A-10 commissioner Linda Bruno, who begins her 12th season at the helm of the league - the longest tenure of any commissioner in the Conference's history. "More importantly, however, the additions of Charlotte and Saint Louis ensure that the future is brighter than it has ever been. We are adding two members who will greatly enhance the national profile of all our sports and expose our programs to two new markets in which our universities actively recruit. The A-10 has never been as strong as it is now."

The Atlantic 10 Conference, which spans eight states and the District of Columbia with a total population of almost 73 million people, will crown champions in 21 sports this season: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's golf, women's lacrosse, men's and women's indoor and outdoor

track & field, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball.

George Washington won its first-ever men's basketball title and represented the Atlantic 10 in the NCAA Tournament. Saint Joseph's and Temple also earned postseason bids with the Hawks reaching the final of the National Invitation Tournament. In women's basketball, the A-10 sent four teams to the postseason as Temple earned the automatic bid by winning its second consecutive Atlantic 10 championship. The Owls were joined by George Washington and Richmond, marking the 11th time in the last 12 years that the A-10 has sent multiple teams to the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament. Xavier also garnered a postseason berth and advanced to the third round of the WNIT.

Rhode Island won its first-ever A-10 baseball championship and earned its first NCAA berth; in field hockey, Richmond, which was ranked as high as 10th nationally, went unbeaten in Conference play for the second straight year in advancing to the NAACAs; Xavier took the league's automatic berth to the NCAA Men's Golf Tournament, where it was joined by Rhode Island; and Richmond won its first A-10 lacrosse title and the bid to the NAACAs.

The Massachusetts women's rowing team won its 10th straight A-10 title, setting a league record for the most consecutive tournament championships won by any team in any sport. UMass also won the ECAC title; George Washington advanced to the second round of the NCAA Men's Soccer Tournament; Dayton lost in overtime in its NCAA women's soccer opener; Massachusetts won its 17th A-10 softball title to advance to the NAACAs; Richmond represented the A-10 in the NCAA men's and women's tennis tournaments; and Dayton won the Conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Volleyball Tournament.

In all, 374 teams have represented the Atlantic 10 Conference in postseason play since the 1976-77 season.
